To the Honorable William Paca Esquire Judge of the District  
Court for the Maryland District

Humbly Complaining sheweth unto your  
Honor your Libellant Charles David of Baltimore County  
Maine that he on or about ~~August~~ the Twenty second <sup>day of August</sup> seven  
hundred and eighty nine on the high Seas and within the  
Jurisdiction of this Court to wit, at the Port of Baltimore  
did enter and ship himself on board a certain Ship called  
the Juliana Commanded by John Kemp Captain and  
Master, and now lying at anchor in the Port of Baltimore  
to perform a voyage in the Capacity of a Sailor at the rate  
of Two Pounds five Shillings Current money per month  
which said voyage was to commence from the <sup>port</sup> Port  
of Baltimore to Bremen thence to Baltimore again,  
as by the Shipping Articles of agreement ~~with~~ here  
with produced reference being there to had will more  
fully appear. And your Libellant further sheweth  
that he hath in the Capacity of a Sailor on board the  
said Brigantine acted and performed the Duties of  
his Station for the Term of Seven Months and a half  
and that the Wages justly due and owing unto him  
therefor amounts to the Sum of Sixteen Pounds seven shillings  
and six pence Current Money of Maryland

Your Libellant further sheweth that the foresaid  
stipulated voyage from Baltimore to Bremen and  
thence back to Baltimore hath been performed and that  
therefor in virtue of the said Articles of Agreement he  
is justly and truly entitled to have and receive his  
Wages amounting as aforesaid to the Sum of Sixteen  
Pounds seven shillings and six pence Current  
Money — Your Libellant further sheweth that  
he has frequently requested the said John Kemp

Master and also <sup>the</sup> owner of the said Brigantine for the  
aforesaid Wages due unto him who always refused to  
paying the same — your Libellant further sheweth  
that the owner of the said Brigantine cannot now  
be found by your Libellant, and your Libellant hath  
Reason to believe he hath absconded with a view to  
evade the payment of this and other Claims against  
him — your Libellant further sheweth that  
he cannot obtain relief but by the Intervention of  
this Honorable Court — your Libellant therefore  
prayeth your Honor that an attachment may  
be issued against the said Brigantine called the  
Juliana her Tackle Apparel and Furniture and  
that the same may by a Decree of this Honorable  
Court be sold for the payment of the Wages  
due as aforesaid unto your Libellant and  
so forth —
