


The United States of America to James H. Gale —
Greetings — You are hereby Commanded to have the
body of Victor Duffey detained under your custody
as it is said, under a safe and sure conduct,
together with the ~~say~~ cause of his being taken,
before me, Judge of the District Court of the United
States for the District of Maryland, at the office of
the Clerk of the District Court aforesaid, at three o'clock
this afternoon, to do and receive, ^{and submit to} all and singular ~~at~~ those
things which I shall then and there determine in this
behalf, and have these things done — Witness my hand
Real this 13th day June 1827.

To the Honorable Elias Glenn Judge of the District Court
of the United States for the District of Maryland.

The undersigned a Captain in the Army of the United
States, to whom the above Habeas Corpus was directed, begs
leave respectfully to make return thereto, that Victor Duffey
enlisted as a Soldier in the Army of the United States
on the eleventh day of June in the year 1827. according to the
provisions of the acts of Congress in such cases made and
provided — and that he is now held and claimed as a
soldier of the said United States under and by virtue of
the said acts of Congress, and the enlistment aforesaid.
